“Everybody gets scared.”



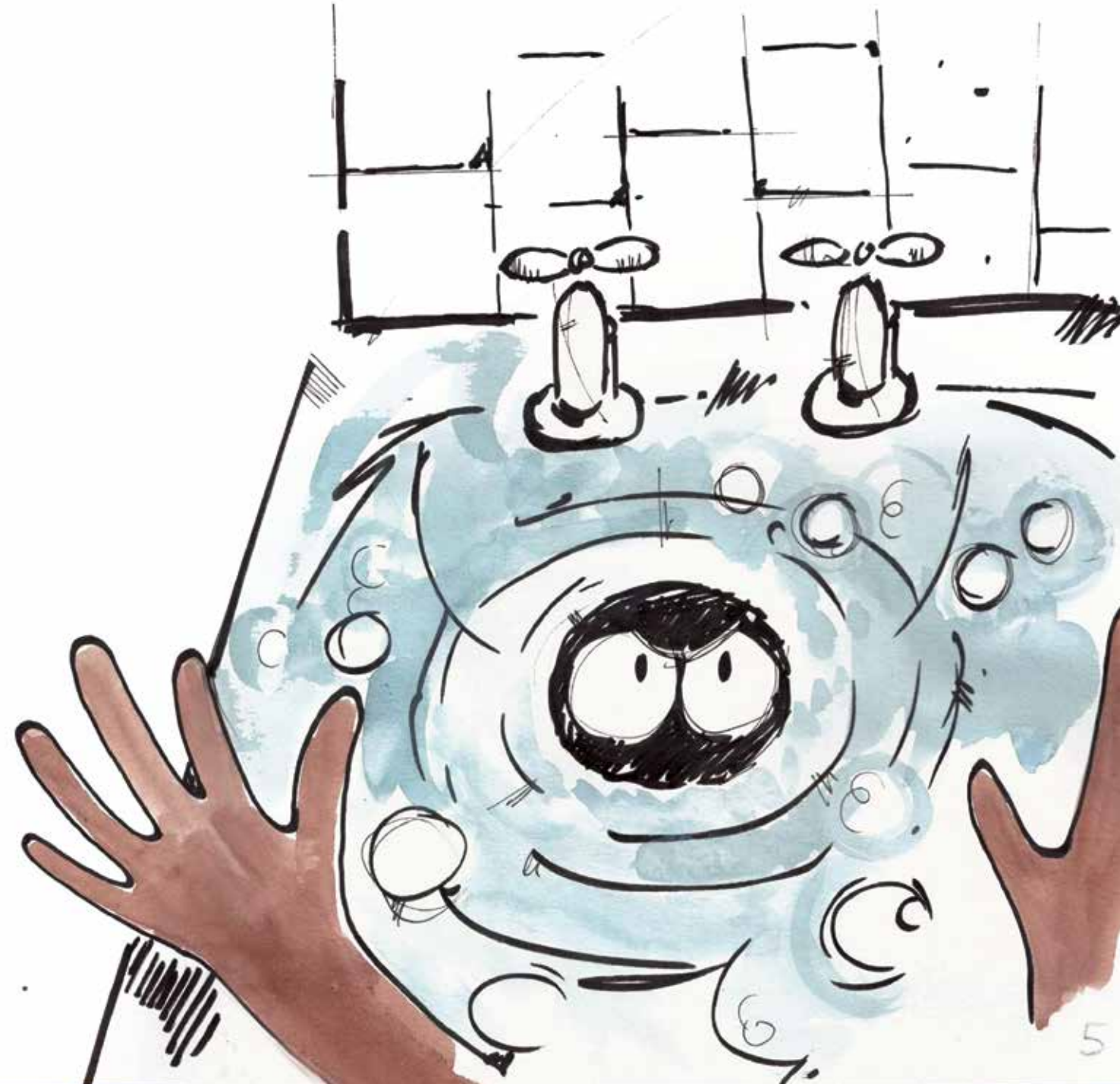
What if there is a monster

and NEVER come back.”



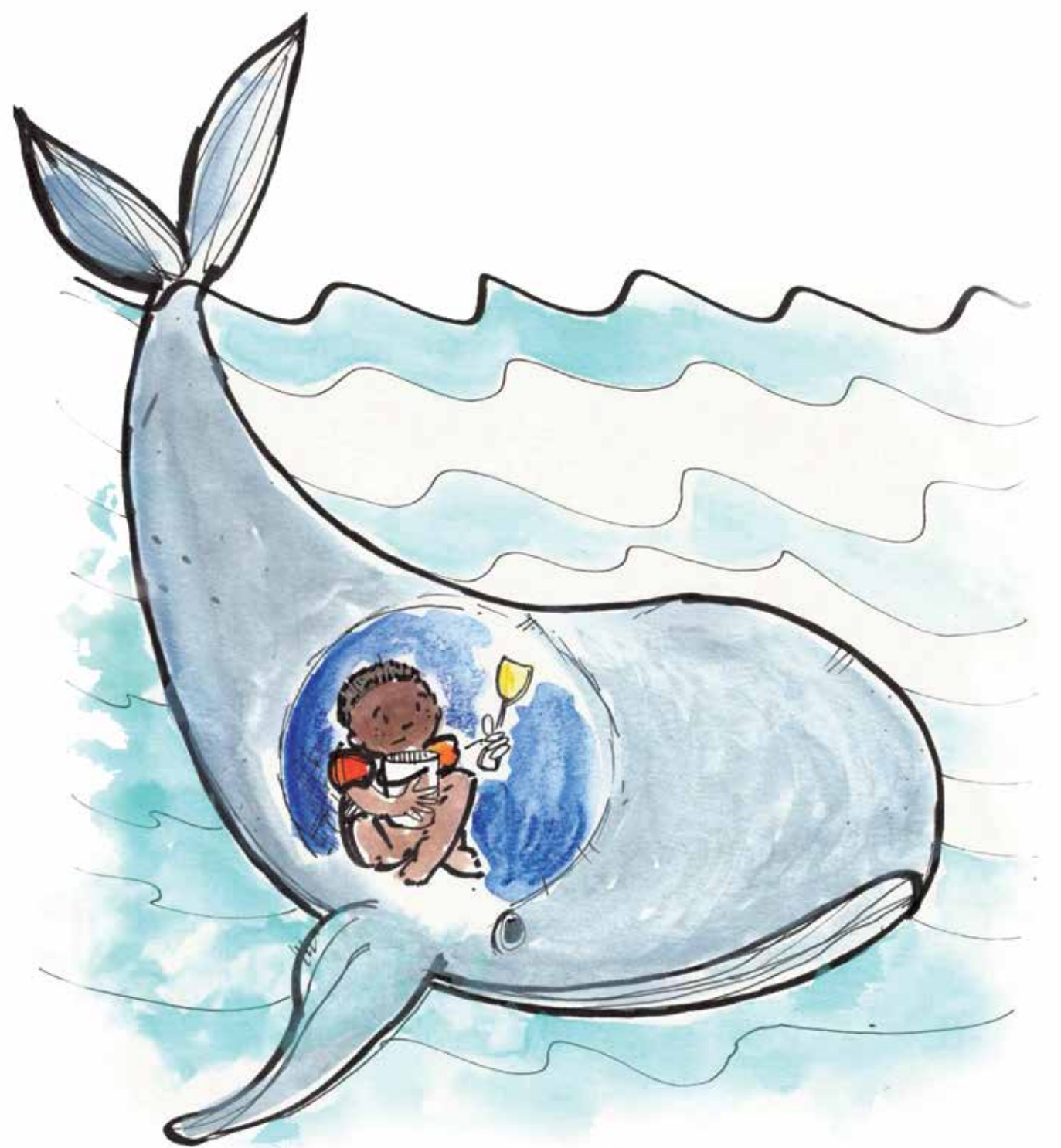
What if there are eyes
