Tig's dad is a writer. **He makes things up.**



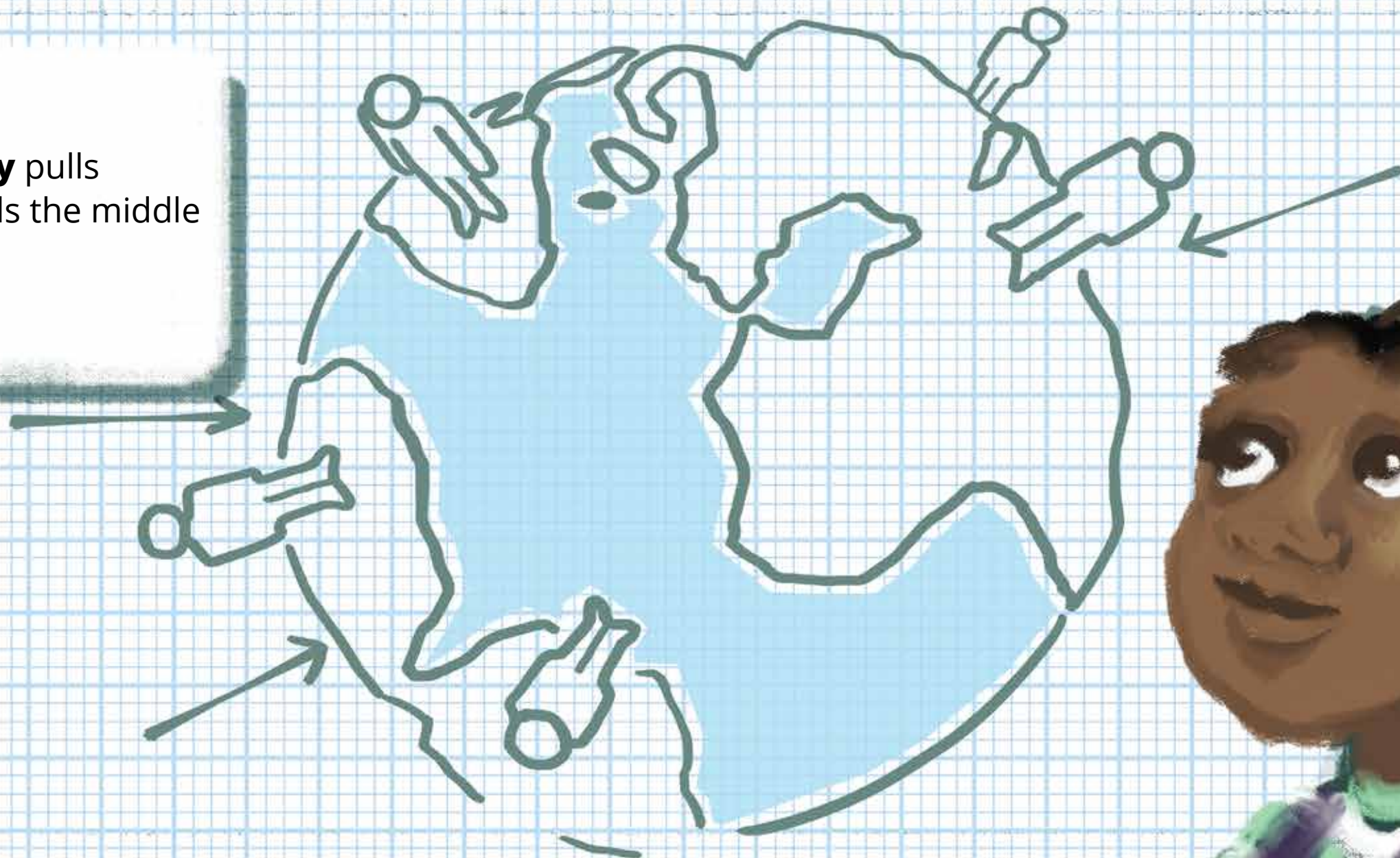


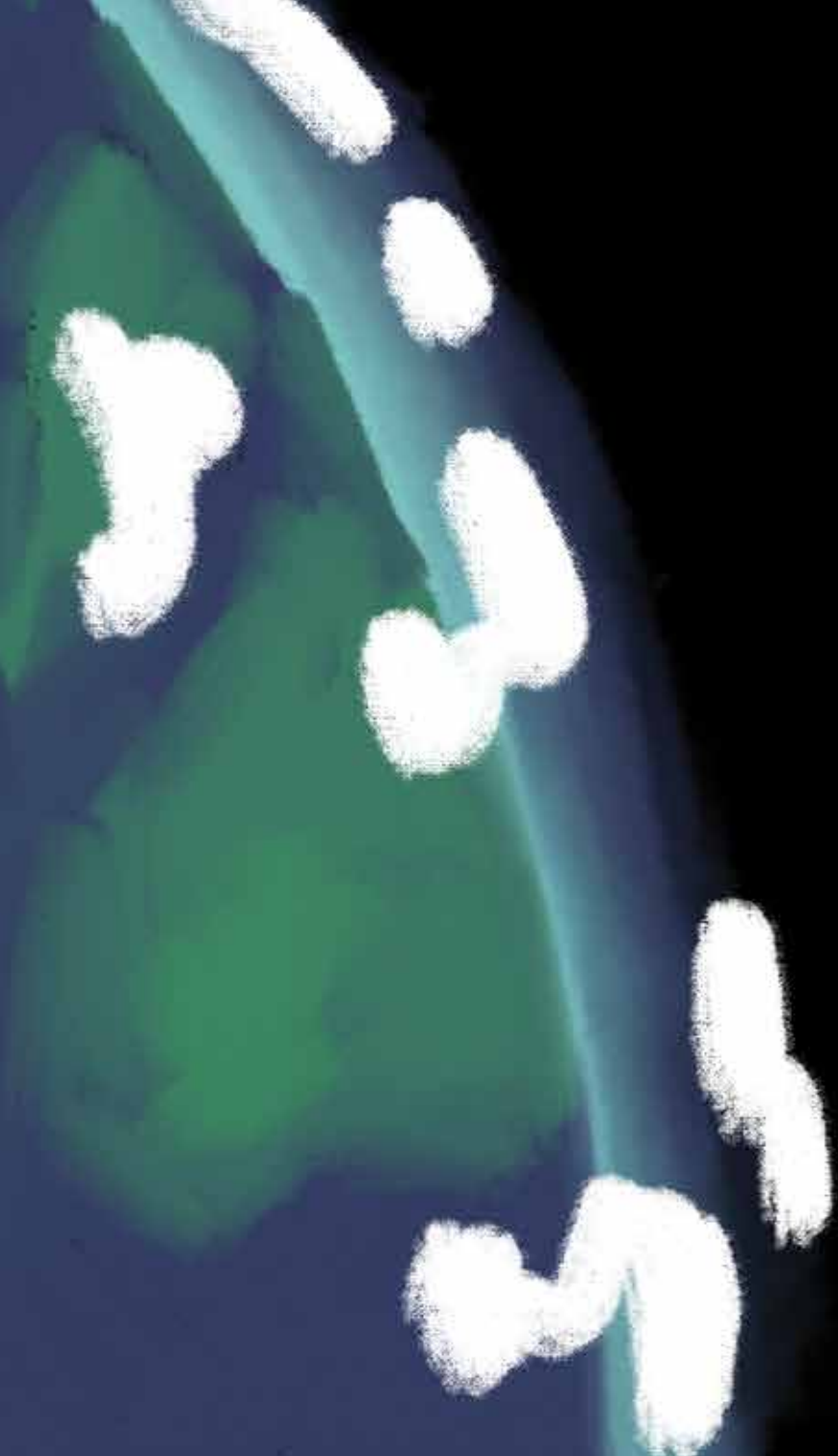
Tig has a globe.

"Because **gravity** pulls everyone towards the middle of the Earth."



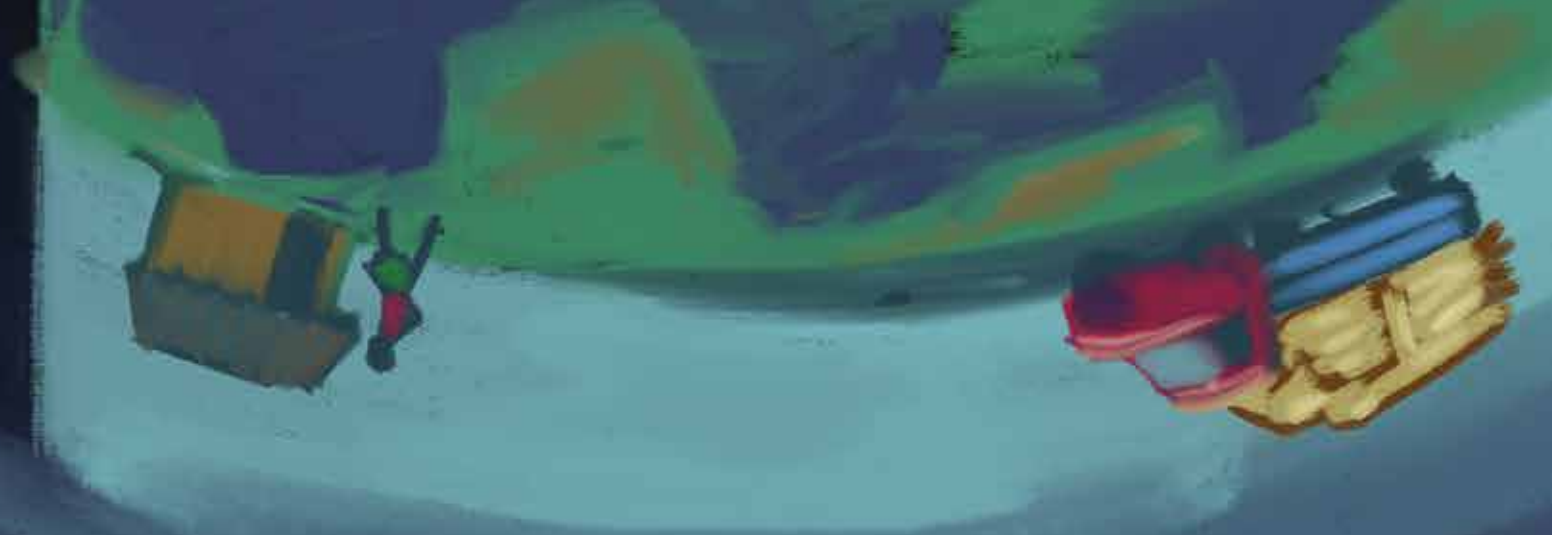


"Wherever you go, the Earth feels like it is below you. Unless you **go into space**. Then there's **no down at all**, and you **float!**"

...and **we** are upside down! Isn't that amazing!"



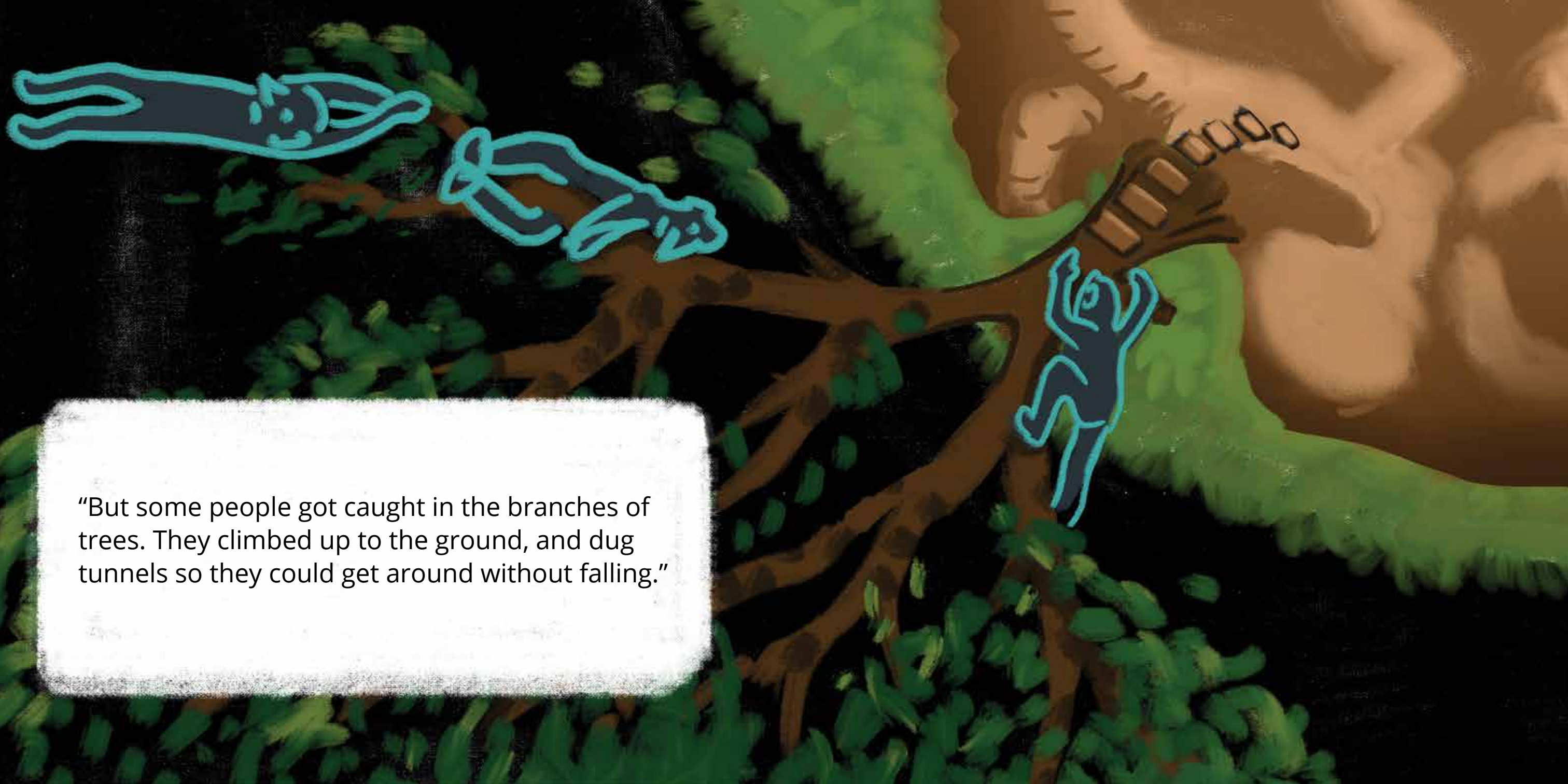
“Dad, if the world is **round**, why don’t the people on the **bottom fall off?**”
