

What's in the Pot?

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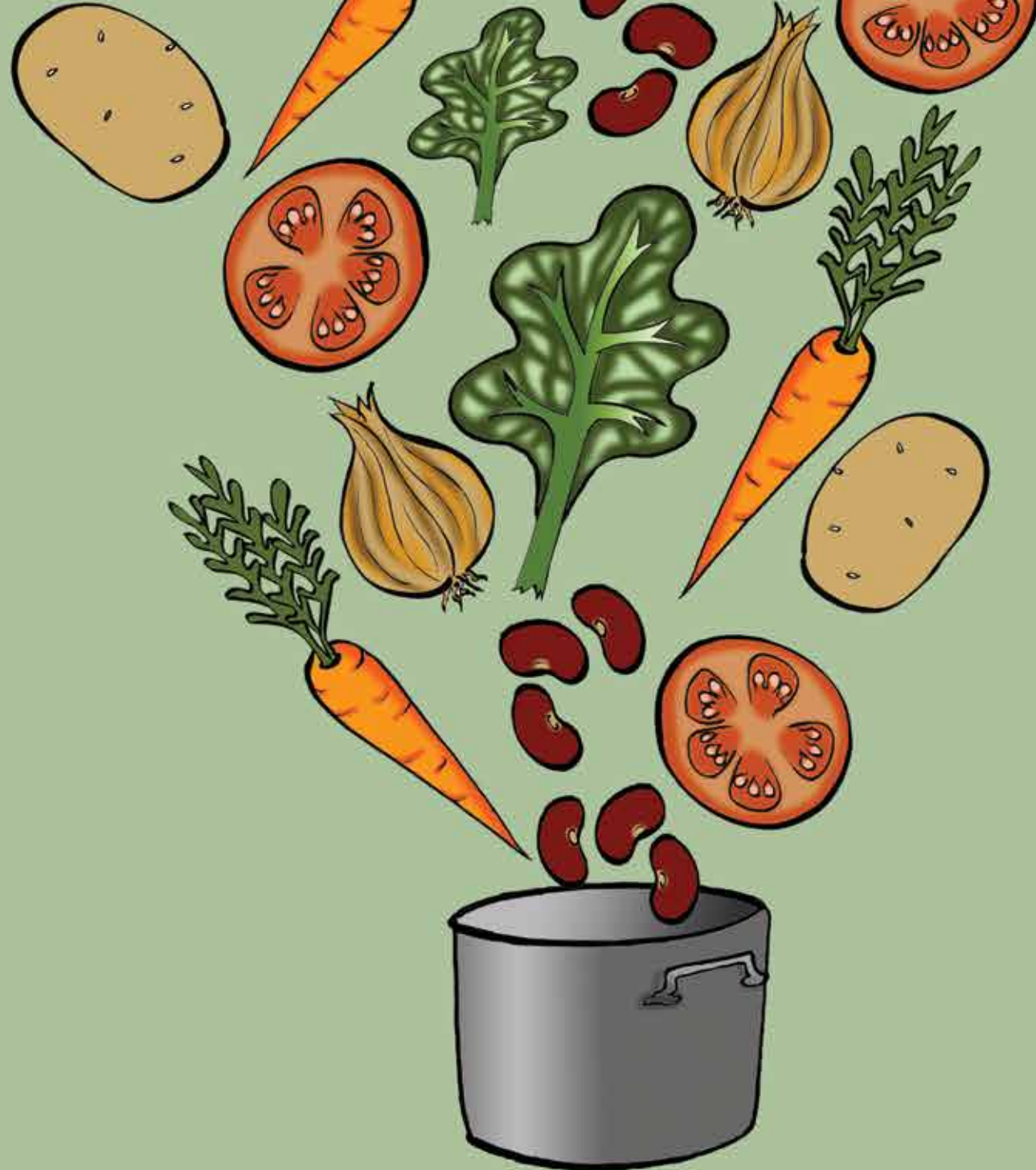
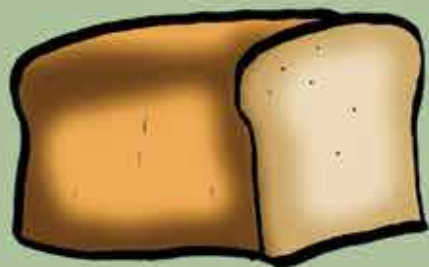


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“What’s for **supper?**”

“Can I **help**?” asked Sam. “I could **stir**.”

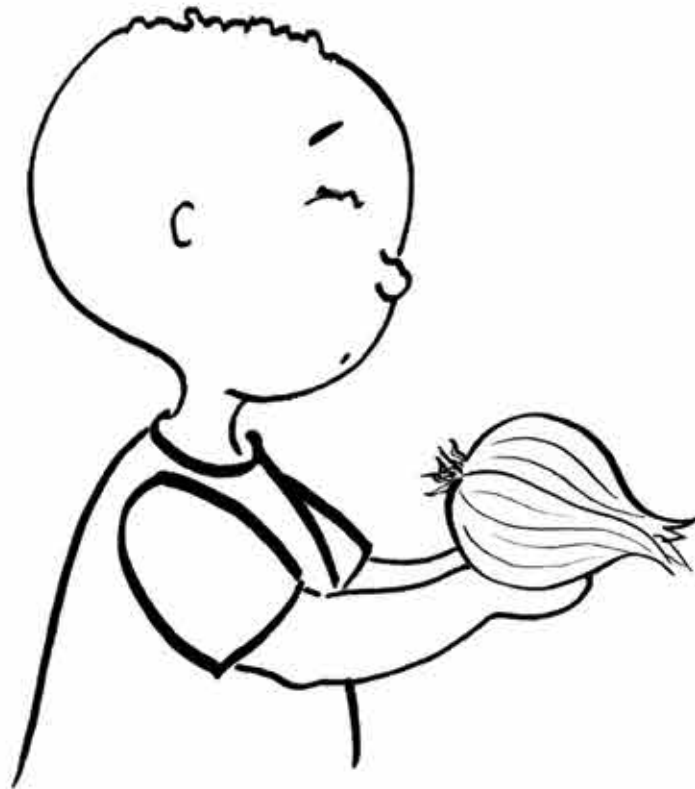
“You are still a bit **short**,”

by **fetching** things.”

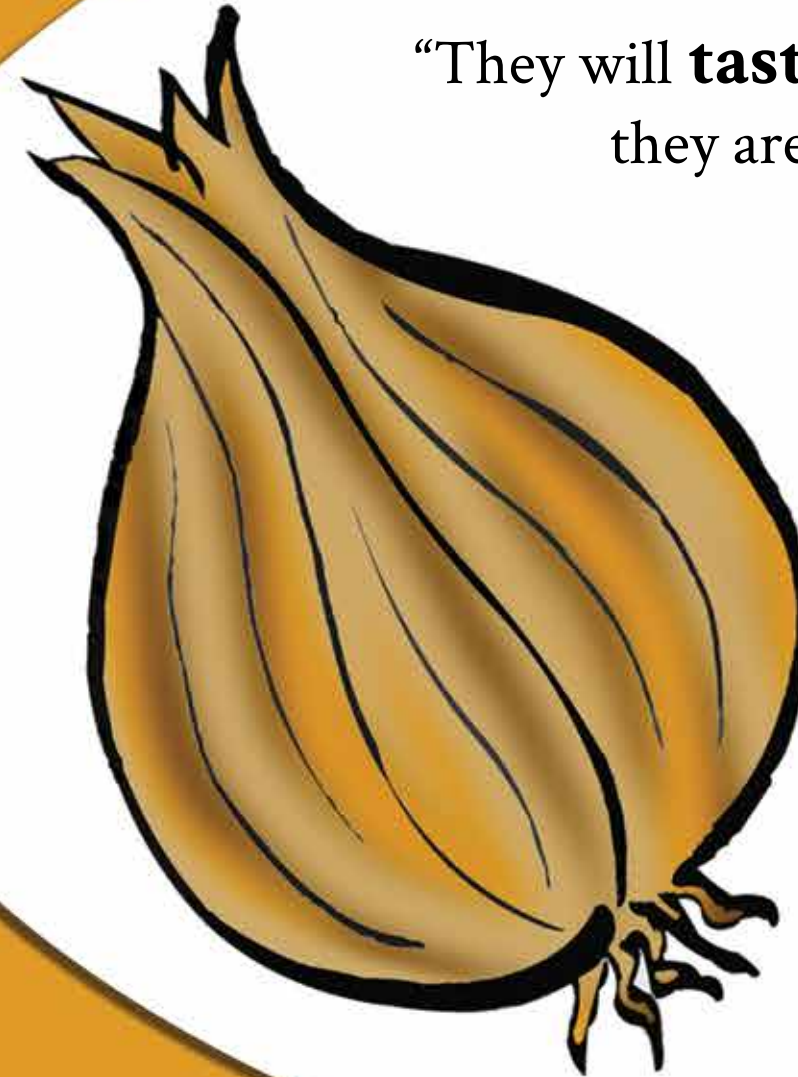


“Can you bring me an **onion**, please.”

but you will find them in the fridge.”

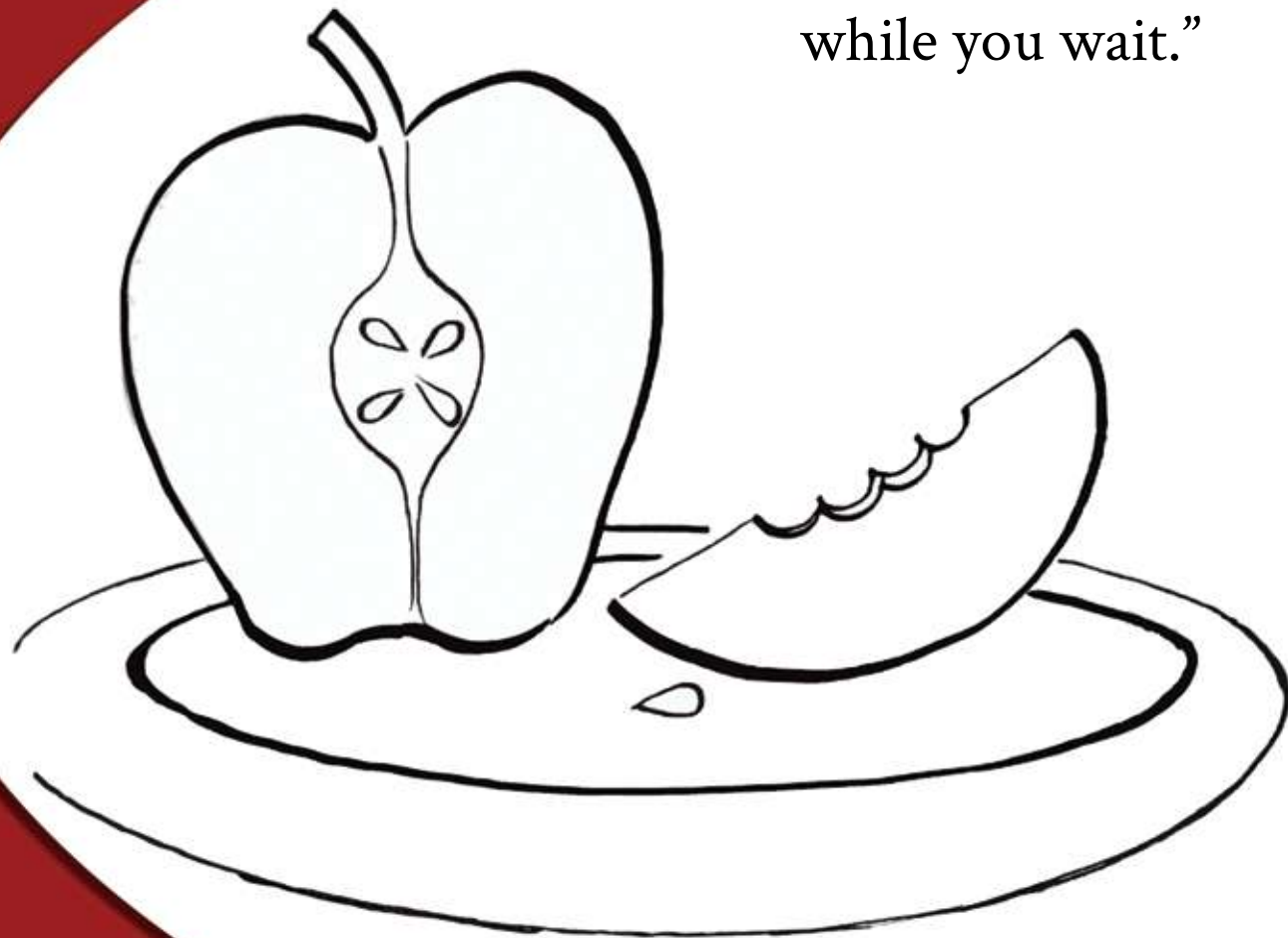


“Can you bring me **potatoes**.

while you wait.”

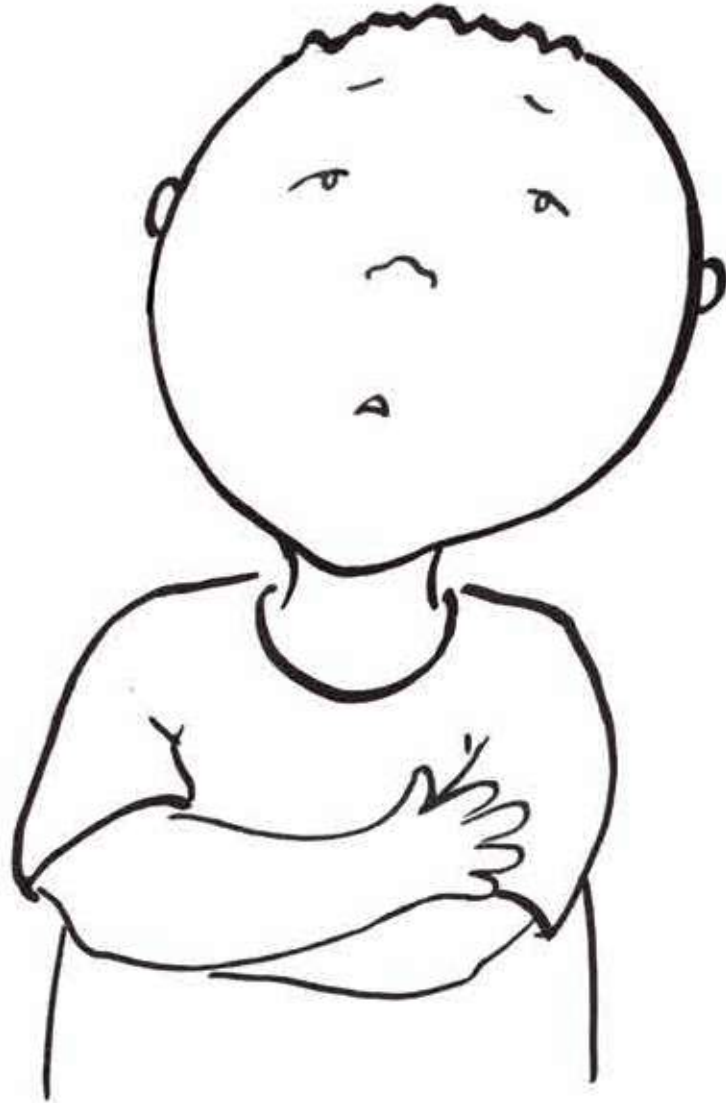


“What about these?”

for after **supper**.”



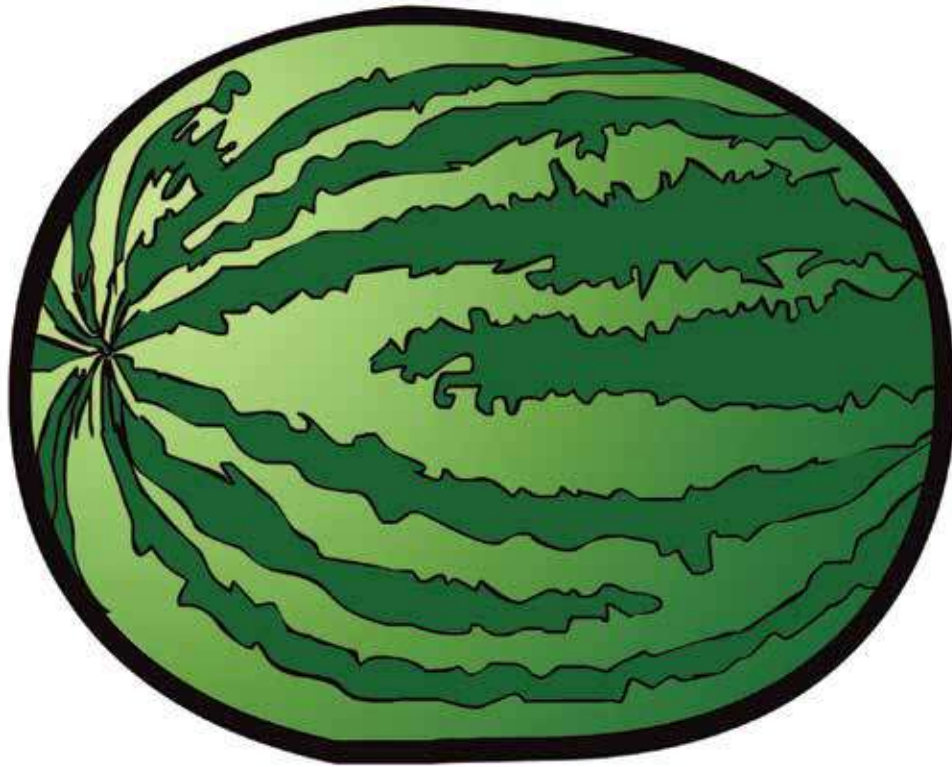
“What’s in the **pot**?”



“It’s a **surprise**. Wait and see.”

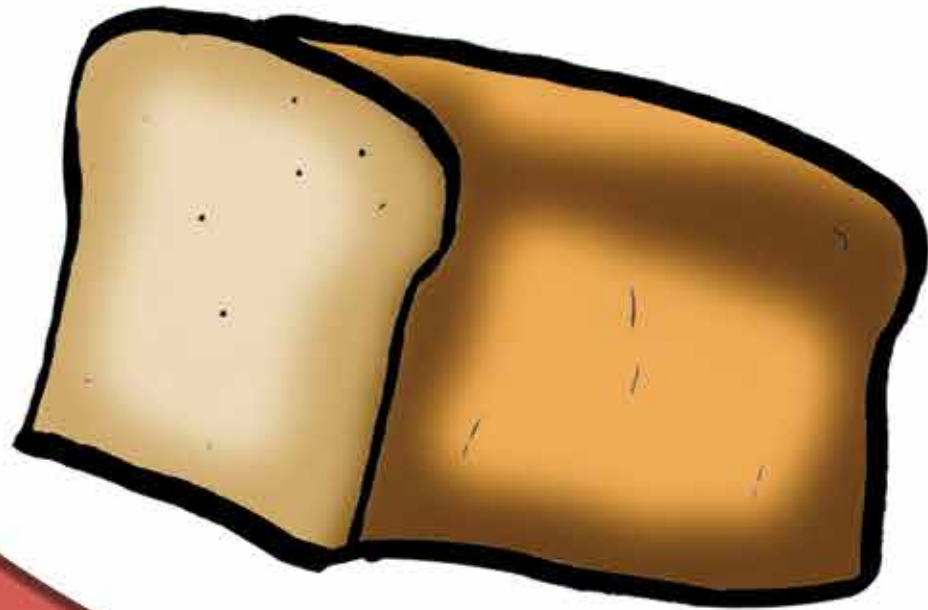
“What about **this?**”

for the pot.”

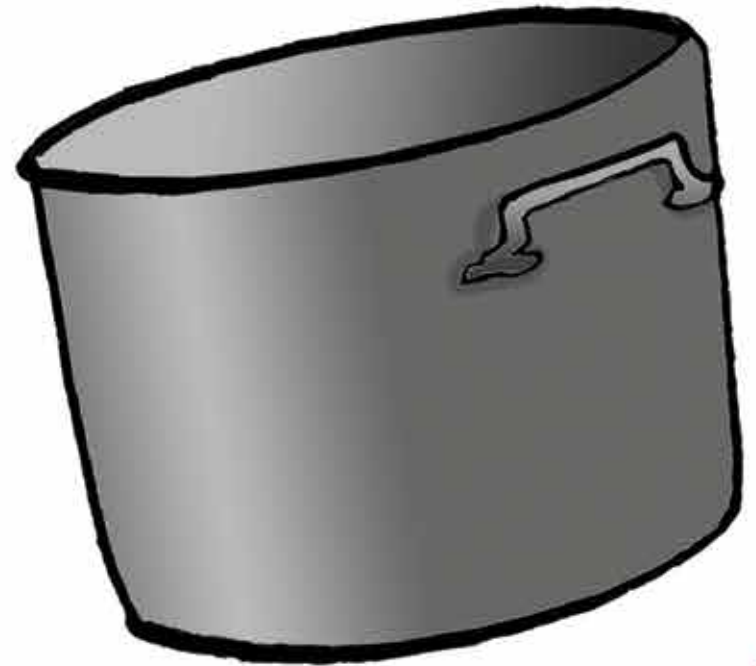


“See if you can find some **spinach**.
