So on New Year's Eve, Musa put on his best clothes and set off to visit Aisha. When he arrived at her house, he knocked on the door and waited nervously.

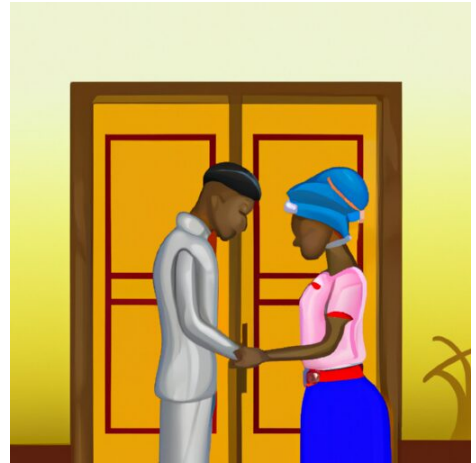
Aisha opened the door and gave Musa a big hug. "I'm so glad you came to visit," she said. "I'm sorry too, for all the times I was mean to you this year."
